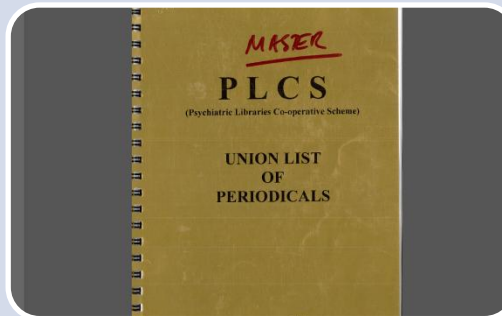

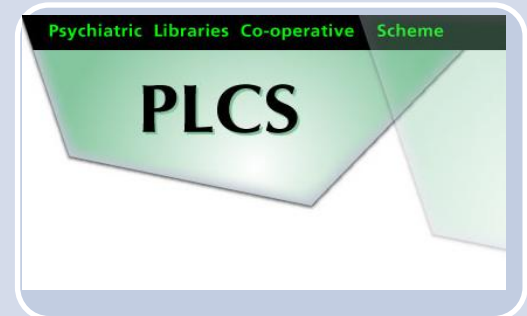
PLCS - a potted history



“to offer support, share resources on a reciprocal basis, and as a meeting venue for librarians working in small libraries within asylums”



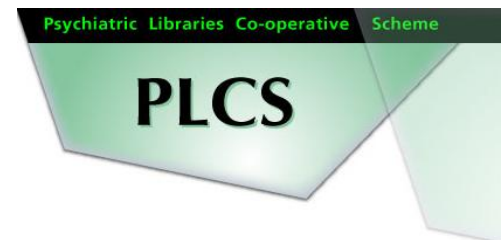

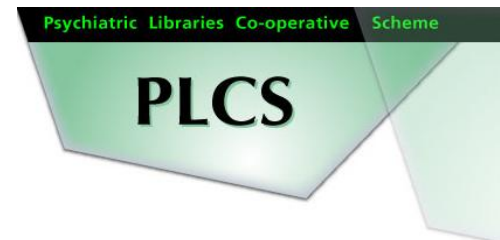
PLCS Survey results

- Total number of respondents – 51 (c75% of membership)

PLCS website. We would like to provide a homepage which expands on what PLCS is and does, rather than going straight to the ILL interface. A possibility would be to provide a brief thumbnail sketch about each library service, highlighting particular areas of interest and /or expertise, eg

Weatherfield Mental Health Trust Library Service. Working across two sites our team of four provide services to a largely urban population. Specialities include drug & alcohol, forensic and mother & baby unit. 2015 saw us begin a clinical librarian pilot.

- 62% indicated that they were interested in developing Library profiles

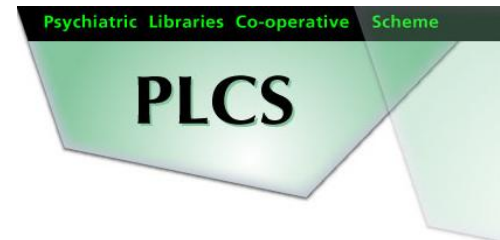


PLCS Survey results

Sharing best practice

There is the potential for a repository of case studies of examples of successful initiatives or services to be hosted on the website. Examples could include recovery colleges, film club.

- 66% indicated that they were interested in this enhancement and that they would be willing to share a case study



PLCS Survey results

CPD, continuing professional development

There is a lot of knowledge and expertise within the PLCS network, and we would like to make it easier for members to tap into that. Possibilities include:

Job shadowing – spending time with somebody from another service **(96% interested)**

Library visits – seeing how services are provided at another location **(97% interested)**

Sharing knowledge and experience – either via e-mail or over the phone if visits are not possible **(100% interested)**

Conference

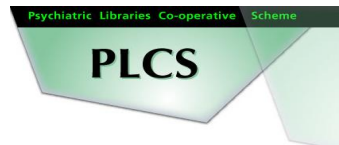
We aim to run a one day, free-to-members conference every two years, likely in London as support from the Royal College of Psychiatrists provides us with a suitable venue. This is traditionally a combination of speakers and workshops, though the format is very fluid.

- **Only 31% of respondents had attended in the past, but 66% indicated they would be likely to attend in the future. June-July was the most popular time of year.**
- **Topics of interest - clinical librarians in mental health; current awareness; Workshops on: social media; revalidation; health and wellbeing including reading groups; e-resources including discovery and point-of-care tools; research repositories**

Webinars

Using webinars to deliver training and awareness sessions enable staff to participate while minimising time away from the workplace and avoiding travel costs.

- **77% of respondents indicated that they would be interested in participating in a webinar**
